### **Chapter Meeting Notes:**

### Corvette Alignment Seminar

Saturday, March 19<sup>th</sup> was the Heart of Ohio Chapter-NCRS technical seminar on C2/C3 Chassis alignment. The seminar was held at **Bee-Line Alignment Service** at 1030 Harmon Avenue, Columbus, OH. We met up with Tim Harbert and Willis Stewart about mid-morning. Tim is the shop manager and schedules the work, tests vehicles and deals with the customers. He is a pleasant and cheerful service-oriented individual and sported long curly locks and a confident attitude. Willis the Alignment Mechanic specialist was old-schooled in the shop; mild manner sort with a great deal of experience under his belt.

The seminar began shortly after Pam Matejovic arrived with her 74' Corvette. Tim backed the Corvette onto the alignment rack with Willis' guidance. The first order of inspection was to determine the C3's rear suspension parameters. Willis checked camber, castor and toe settings. He also inspected the rear bushings, spindle bearings and shocks to insure alignment would not be affected by worn parts.

Willis discover that the passenger strut bushings on Pam's Corvette were worn, affecting the camber alignment. Coupled with that, the rear toe was also out of

specifications but not so much that it warranted immediate attention. Pam was informed that aligning the toe, on her C3 chassis in the current condition would normally be an all day job with a cost to match the hours involved to perform the adjustments. Willis notified Pam that the toe alignment should checked again after the driving season just to keep an eye on this setting as a precaution.

Tim turned the Corvette around and the front-end alignment was inspected as the next order of operations. Once again Willis crawled underneath the Corvette and did his inspections of joints, bearings and shocks. Tim remained in the vehicle turn the steering wheel from side to side to assist Willis during the steering linkage inspection. The outcome on the front was more welcoming than the rear alignment specifications. All bushings, bearings, linkage and shocks were in good working order with alignment specifications near factory specs.

Willis used good old-school mechanical methods in the alignment inspection process much like was used when the C2 & C3 chassis were



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Page 3 ====== manufactured. A long graduated bar was used to check castor and toe. A pendulum device pressed against the Corvette's rims was used to determine camber. Willis also rocked the tires both on and off the rack with full vehicle weight and no weight. These steps helped determine bushings and bearing endplay. Willis knowledge of Corvette alignment proved to be without question and reassuringly helpful as most of us posed question during each step of his process.

I had compiled a booklet that was handed out at the beginning of the seminar to assist members in determining the process and a definition of terms to help understand what was being talked about. The booklet contained Alignment Definitions, Alignment Terminology, Chevrolet Corvette Assembly Instructions and Recommended Alignment Specifications from Vette Brake Products. If you would like a copy, let me know, I do have a few copies left.




# The History of Bee-Line Alignment

The Bee-Line Alignment service name has been long



standing in the alignment industry since the 1920s. Here is a capsule of Bee-line history.

**Bee Line** began as the George L. Hunt Company of Boscobel, Wisconsin. Before World War 1, George L. Hunt (founder, inventor and manufacturer)

## Get Ready for Summer Driving with Spring Cleaning

(Advice from the experts at *Motor Trend -* from their website)

Spring thaw is right around the corner, which means it's also time to get your car ready for the Summer season and the proverbial family vacation. If you're lucky enough to live in an area of the country that has real winters, but wouldn't dream of driving your "summer car" through snow, salt, and slush, here's some car care advice from the experts at



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# First things first: Mechanical musts

Before you even start your mummified car this spring, there are key mechanical components that require your attention. We've consulted with ASE-certified mechanics and put together a quick to-do list to help you through the process.

#### **Slippery solutions**

While the car is still in the garage, the first thing you should do is change your oil and oil filter with fresh oil and filter because water and other contaminants might have accumulated while it's been sitting. Consult your owners manual for the proper procedure and correct capacity and type of oil, or if you don't have a manual, measure the amount of oil that comes out

and replace it with the same amount. Don't forget to undo the oil filler cap on top of the engine, as this will allow the oil to drain more efficiently. Also, its very important to fill the new oil filter with the fresh oil before installing to prevent a dry start while the lubricant makes its way through the system. Also, it's a good idea to replace the copper crush ring on the drain plug to ensure a proper seal.

#### Mr. (anti-)Freeze

Over time, cooling system performance is degraded in several ways. If you've seen the brown water that comes from a neglected system you

already know that two of the demons living inside the cooling system are rust and corrosion. They can eat away at components from the inside out. Weak acids form from the breakdown of antifreeze, and the use of hard tap water in the system leaves mineral deposits that can build up and restrict flow of coolant. This is why it's recommended you only use distilled water in the system. There are a number of antifreeze testing methods available such as test strips and antifreeze-to-water ratio gauges, and they will each give you valuable information on the state of your system. If you

choose to flush your cooling system, there many kits with hose attachments at most auto parts stores, but be sure you follow the instructions carefully--especially in older, and perhaps more neglected systems.

Now check all fluid reservoirs for proper levels and possible contaminants: Brake fluid, power steering, even washer fluid. Consult your owner's manual for fluid specifications and levels, although the levels are usually embossed on the reservoirs themselves.

#### On the Brakes

Because flushing a vehicle's brake system isn't usually listed on the routine maintenance schedule, it's often overlooked or assumed unnecessary--wrong. Conventional glycol-based brake and power steering fluids are hygroscopic, which means they absorbs water. This can cause several problems, not the least of which is reduced braking performance or steering control. Although fresh brake fluid is transparent with a light amber color (not dark, cloudy or milky), it may still need to be flushed. Again, there are several methods of checking the fluid beyond eyeballing it: test strips from



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Page 6 ==== Wagner Brake products (314/977-0300), and even a hand-held machine from Phoenix Systems, a company specializing in professionalgrade brake system tools (888/749-7977), that literally boils a gathered sample tells you how much water is in the sample. If you're a do-ityourselfer, the tricky flushing procedure can be aggravating at best, and dangerous at worst. We'd recommend letting a pro do it for you.

#### A Good Belt

Check all belts and hoses for condition and adjustment. This is task that's more hands-on than anything else. Look and feel for dried out or cracked rubber, paying special attention to where hoses make bends or are connected by clamps. If a hose needs to be replaced, remove it and take it to your local parts store for replacement. The condition of belts and pulleys should be inspected by looking and feeling all the way around. Belts with frayed edges or delaminated fibers should be replaced. There's usually a part number on the belt itself, but again, it's a good idea to take it with you when you go for the replacement.

#### **Fuel System**

If you didn't drain the fuel out of your vehicle before storage, or didn't add a fuel preservative before winter, you'll want to do this now and refill it with fresh fuel. Even a full, untreated tank can condense water into the system and break down creating varnish and gum deposits over time. Add a fuel antifreeze/conditioner such as Sta-Bil concentrated fuel stabilizer from Golden Eagle or STP Fuel Stabilizer to reduce any condensation that's accumulated during storage.

#### Charged Up?

Unless you've invested in a trickle charger and it's been in place all winter tending to your battery, you might need a new battery. If not, clean both battery cable connections with a wire brush and a water/baking soda mixture if necessary. Before starting vehicles that are not computercontrolled, disable the ignition system (by removing the ground coil wire, etc.) and crank your vehicle for 30 seconds. For modern EFI cars. removing the fuse for the fuel pump will prevent engine fireup during a 30-sec crankover. This will pump oil through the engine without doing any

damage caused by a dry start. (For modern EFI cars, removing the fuse for the fuel pump will prevent engine fire-up during a 30-sec crankover.)

#### Fire it up!

Open all the garage doors possible and finally, start your engine! As the vehicle is running, again make sure you have no leaks from coolant hoses, oil filter and plug, etc. As the vehicle warms up, check all gauges, frequently making sure the engine is not overheating and the charging system is working properly. After your vehicle reaches operating temperature, check your automatic-transmission fluid for color and proper level. Consult the owner's manual for the proper procedure, and add fluid if necessary. Remember, before vou take your first drive, check all lights, horn, turn signals, and wipers. Now you're ready to drive! While driving, make your first three or four stops slowly and carefully. And don't wait for the entire fuel tank to empty; add fresh fuel to your vehicle as you drive.
