Chapter Meeting Notes

Our third Tech Session – "Repairing Paint Chips" – was held April 1st at Randy Rink's home in Thornville. Randy has a great garage/shop behind his home and this is where we had our seminar. About 10 HoO Members attended and we all had a chance to repair a number of real paint chips on the hood of Randy's 1983 Pontiac Trans Am. We also had a great lunch.



Randy first conducted a demonstration for the assembled group on how to prep a paint chip for touching up. The chip he demonstrated on was about the size of a dime and it had rust traces around the edge. It was located in the center of the Trans Am's hood which made for an ideal demonstration subject. While rust is not a problem with Corvette's many of the prepping steps are the same and we also discussed prepping paint chips that are through the gelcoat. Once Randy had this spot prepped he next showed us how to paint it.

With the painting completed Randy's next lesson was how to finish the touch up by sanding and polishing. Because of the need for it to dry for a few days he couldn't demonstrate this on the chip he just painted, so like Emeril cooking an exotic dish on Food TV, he jumped to another large paint chip he had prepped earlier. On this chip he showed us how to reduce the touch up paint and make it flush with the old finish buy "shaving" it, sanding it and then polishing it. When he was done I was amazed at the results and I think everyone else was too.



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Next it was our turn to try our hand at what we had learned. For this part of the lesson Randy had prepped perhaps 20 spots on the hood of his Trans Am for us to practice on. And practice we did!



Randy made up "Paint Chip Kits" for each of us to use which consisted of a razor blade, a sanding block, several small pieces of various grit sanding paper and instructions. (His instruction sheet is reprinted on page 11.) He also had a number of different polishing compounds available for us.

I learned very quickly that "scrape – sand – polish" is not as easy as Randy made it look. On my first spot I scrapped too hard and left a large "dimple" where the new paint was supposed to be flush. Then I sanded it a bit too much and in too wide an area. Oops – glad he is going to get the hood repainted.

On my next attempt I nixed scarping with the razor blade in favor of just sanding the spot. That worked a lot better but it took me a little longer. Also, I sanded too large an area. (Not my car!) Then I used several polishing compounds to remove the sanding scratches. The end result wasn't too bad

and I could see that with little practice, and a lot more patience, that I could do a pretty good based on what I learned.



After we had all practiced to our heart's content it was time for lunch. Randy and his wife Priscilla grilled a bunch of brats and provided several side dishes, condiments and deserts for our group. Helping them out was Sue Yasher, Perry's wife. And, as is customary with food service at the Rink's (also know as Stony Creek Farms), there was homemade (VERY) hot (Habanero) sauce and beer to accompany our meal.

Thus, with our learning being done for day, we relaxed and talked among ourselves about – what else – Corvettes.

Thanks Randy (and Pricilla and Sue) for a great tech seminar and a great meal! And a special thanks to Randy's Trans Am for being our guinea pig.

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HEART OF OHIO CHAPTER OFFICERS

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Paint Chip Repair Instructions - By Randy Rink

Surface Preparation is of Primary Importance

Remove rust if it is not a Corvette.

Remove any loose paint with an X-Acto knife or similar weapon. You can't glue down loose paint with touch up paint!

 $\textbf{Degrease} \ with \ a \ wax/grease \ remover \ like \ Sherwin \ Williams \ R7 \ K \ 156 \ \ "Sher-Will-Clean", \ Ditzler \ "Ditzo", \ Western \ RS500 \ or \ the \ like.$

Prime the surface (if it is not a Corvette or if the chip impact damaged the gel-coat) with a self-etching primer like Sherwin Williams 988. **Be sure to wait 30 minutes or so to let the primer dry**.

Wet sand with a block and 1000 grit or finer paper to **remove primer from the surface** of the good paint perimeter. The idea is to minimize color paint removal and only remove the primer from the surrounding good paint surface.

Let dry again.

Paint

Degrease again.

Take quite a bit of time to let everything dry, have a meal, do another chore or drink a beer.

Locate the proper touch up paint from your car dealer parts department or a good auto parts store. I usually get a tube when I purchase the car... you will need it sooner or later.

Be sure to shake the paint as long as you can to certify everything is in suspension, this is especially important with metallic paints.

Carefully dab the chip site with the touch up paintbrush trying to fill the cavity slightly higher than the surface. After the paint has dried, if the paint shrinks below the surface, dab again so there is slightly more dried paint above the finished surface.

Let dry, overnight if possible.

Surface Sanding

If the paint is well above the finished surface, use the safety razor to "scoop" the excess off of the surface. Leave a slight amount of excess paint to wet sand down to perfection.

Begin wet sanding with 400 grit paper and a bucket of water with a drop or two of dish washing detergent for lubrication. Always use the sanding block and try to avoid scratching too much surface paint. This grade of paper is good to remove the majority of excess paint, don't use 400 too much. Change to 800 grit and remove any remaining paint above the finished surface. Rinse the surface and sanding block often.

Finish surface sanding with 1000 grit and begin blending the finished surface with the touch up surface, **no gaps should be present**. It may be easier to dry the surface to check for gaps. **You may need to degrease and add more paint to fill gaps**. If this is necessary, wet sand newly added paint as before.

Surface Polishing

Locate your rubbing compound. Follow instructions regarding a clean moist terry-cloth towel. Polish in a circular fashion ending up by polishing parallel to the lines of the car. Buff the surface with a clean dry cloth.

Finish this project with a polishing compound and use this in the same manner as the rubbing compound. **No scratches should be visible at this point,** you may need to wet sand with 1000 in the direction of the lines of the car to remove any.

Wax

Clean and wax the surface with your favorite wax system. Do the whole car if you feel like it. NOTE: car wax is useful to protect metal surfaces from corrosion after a new paint chip injury, just load it in, let it dry and buff it off.
