Mid Year Headlight Restoration Guide (Part 4)

Assembly of Headlight Motors, Housings and reinstalling into car

Headlight Motor Assembly

Process is basically the reverse of the disassembly. Be sure to use a white type of grease, (we use Lubriplate) to lubricate the bushings for the shaft of the armature, the gears and other surfaces. Note that Duke Williams recommends a full synthetic NGLI #2 "general purpose" grease, which should be available at most parts stores. The synthetic base oil will not evaporate as fast as conventional base oil.

- 1. Armature inserted into motor housing being careful with the brush assembly that is soldered to the housing.
- 2. Install the brushes, springs and using the clips, slide the assembly down into the case over the commutator being careful not to scratch the brushes or the commutator.
- 3. Mount the back gear case cover using the two long bolts connect these together. The Hand Wheel is installed over the shaft on the motor case and the retainer is installed to hold it on. Run bench test shown below.
- 4. Gears with washers are installed into the gear case, using plenty of grease, but don't pack the entire housing.
- 5. The front gear cover is installed with the 4 small hex bolts.

- 6. Adjust end clearance with set screw to provide just enough clearance to turn freely, test for freely turning.
- 7. May rerun bench test again as below.
- 8. Motor bracket is installed with 2 slotted screws.

Bench Testing Procedure: used a 12 volt supply to test the motors. Ground the battery to the case and the electrical terminals are use to turn the motor in both direction, one terminal to open and the other terminal to close headlight housing.

Assembly of Headlight Housing

Note, the right and the left side headlight housing have different components, be sure to sort the components correctly.

- 1. Both the inboard and outboard shafts can be installed with the 4 small flat head screws.
- 2. We installed the headlight adjustment brackets, and retainer springs that you may not have removed.
- 3. The headlight harness is inserted through the outboard shaft. Outboard retainer must be inserted over the wires before the connector plug is installed on the wires.
- 4. Install the large flat washer onto the rubber seat and slip onto both inboard and outboard shaft with the metal washer facing toward the headlight housing.
- 5. The pivot balls can be inserted over both shafts.
- 6. Both inner and outer pivot housing can be place of the shaft leaving space to slide onto the valance where they will be on the outside side of the reinforcement support plate.
- 7. The outside stop collar can be placed over the outer shaft and loosely tighten. Final tighten must be done after assembly in the car and the headlight bucket is aligned.



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- 8. Install wiring harness connector to three wires coming out of outboard shaft. Note that collar must be over wires before connector is installed.
- 9. This unit is ready to be installed in the car and the Y-Stop bracket must be installed after the unit is in the car.

<u>Installing Headlight Housing Assembly into Front</u> Valance of Car

- 1. Masking tape edges of headlight housing to prevent chipping paint if not already completed.
- 2. Carefully insert headlight housing at an angle into opening in valance.
- 3. Slip into slots in valance support, keeping the rubber seal with its metal washer on the outside side of the reinforcement support plate (both sides).
- 4. Slide both pivot housing toward reinforcement support plates and align holes in housing with bolt holes in valance support. Note: the 3 holes are not symmetrical and it only fits in one position.
- 5. From inside the headlight housing, align large hole in housing to insert bolt through housing and into hole in the reinforcement support plate and loosely secure pivot housing.
- 6. Rotate headlight housing to align remaining holes to insert and lightly tighten remaining bolts.
- 7. Tighten all six bolts while aligning headlight housing with front valance of car. Note space

- between housing and valance is even on all side and aligns with the valance.
- 8. Slide the collar stop tight against the outside of the ball and tighten allen screw.
- 9. Install the Y stop by aligning the center of the fluted section of the shaft with the mark on the Y Stop. Be sure that they Y Stop will move back and forth between the open stop and the close stop. It is very difficult to see the alignment mark, so trial and error may work best.
- 10. Tighten bolt holding y-stop on shaft.
- 11. Adjust the Y stop screws and the alignment on the shaft to get the headlight housing to open and close with the proper alignment to the valance.
- 12. Connect the housing wiring harness to the front light harness
- 13. Test that headlight housing rotates easily
- 14. Adjust alignment until satisfied.



Installing Headlight Motors

1. Slide motor onto shaft which may require turning the hand wheel to align the shaft on the end of the motor assembly to align with the shaft on the headlight housing assembly.



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- 2. Install brace from motor case to valance, attaching ground wire to this bracket where it attaches to motor.
- 3. Install spring clip
- 4. Plug in wiring harness to motor and to micro switch.
- 5. Test that the headlight assembly opens and closes and is aligned with valance. Readjust as necessary.

Winter Storage – Car in a Bubble

I purchased a CarCapsule for winter storage of my '67 Corvette four years ago. I personally love the item and feel that it was necessary for my car for two main reasons. First, my garage is over 70 years old (I envy you guys with really nice modern garages) and isn't "sealed" very well against the elements or vermin (mice and squirrels). Second, my garage houses both my Corvette and my wife's car that she drives every day resulting in lots of moisture (rain and snow) entering the garage on a regular basis. So, since spending \$50K to build a new garage wasn't in my immediate future, I bought the 18' CarCapsule for just under \$400.00. As you can see by the pictures, I put my Vette in bubble each fall



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after I clean her up and polish and wax her for the winter. For the past two years, I have parked the Vette on flat-stopper ramps in the bubble helping to keep my bias ply tires from developing a long-term flat spot. They seem to work very well.

Here's what CarCapsule says about their product. The CarCapsule is a clear vinyl bubble that completely seals and protects your vehicle from things like corrosion, rust, dust, dirt, dings and even fingerprints. The indoor vinyl "bubble" is constructed of 10 mil anti-static, double-polished, radio frequency welded, 100% PVC and is so strong that you can bounce a 5lb. hammer off it (I actually did this and almost hit myself in the head when the hammer came flying back at me). The base of the capsule is composed of 18 oz. Herculite and is impervious to oil, gas and antifreeze, abrasionresistant, mildew-resistant, and will not support a flame. The base mat is connected to the "bubble" by a heavy-duty 100% nylon zipper that will not scratch your car. The heart of the CarCapsule is a12-volt, high-pressure fan that provides continuous, filtered airflow that keeps your vehicle dry and rust free by exchanging the air inside the "bubble" 3-4 times/hour (see picture below). For those that might be interested, they also make a smaller version of this bubble for motorcycles.



So, does it work? My short answer is yes. But let's take a closer look. The bubble clearly provides a great deal of protection for my car during the winter months. As I already stated, I tested out the hammer throw and it worked. As you can see from the picture, you can even stack a chair on the bubble and it doesn't touch the car. When my children were



younger, all sorts of items like bikes and scooters would end up leaning against the wall next to the Vette. The bubble keeps any of these items from ever hitting the car and that's a very good thing. Even if my wife parks her car too close to the Vette and opens her car door absentmindedly, it won't hit the car because the bubble stops it.



In the four years that I've owned the bubble, I have never had a mouse or squirrel decide to live in my car's engine bay or interior even though there has been evidence of them visiting the garage. No chewed wires or nests, that's definitely a plus! Finally, although lots of dust accumulates on the outside of the CarCapsule during the course of the winter, all this dirt and grime stays out of the interior due to the filtered air flow of the capsule. This makes my prewinter waxing look like new each spring when I take the car out of the capsule for the first time.



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
Heart of Ohio Chapter-NCRS/Coughlin Charity Swap Meet



From the Judging Co-Chairman

Winter 2012 Meet Musings

If you want some additional judging experience, and/or to add some important judging points to your total, then 2012 is the year for you. This year there will be four Chapter meets in Ohio, one in Michigan, two in Indiana, and the closest Regional meet is hosted by the Pittsburgh Chapter in Altoona PA. Then there is the National meet in San Diego. While 100 judging points and the Master Judge black hat may seem far away for some of you (while others of you are shooting for 200 or more points), it is certainly an achievable goal. For example, we have a bunch of master judges in our chapter, including several of our members who earned it in 2011 (Herb Harlton. Terry Buchanan, and Mike Treece), and some of us who are getting close.

Below are events during the first half of 2012 that have already posted where you can earn some judging experience and points (and these are just the ones that we know about right now). Except for Nationals and some of the Regionals, the rest are within driving distance of Central Ohio. Just in case you aren't sure, here are the point breakdowns: Chapter Judging School and Tech Sessions are typically worth 1 point; Chapter meets can land you 2 or 3 points (depending on whether there is an additional Judging School or Tech Session); Regional meets can accrue up to 7 points; and the National meet can net you up to 15 points.

January 21 HOH Judging School (wheels, hubcaps, tires); January 26-28 Florida Regional Kissimmee; February 18 HOH Tech Session (NCRS website); March 8-10 Arizona Regional Tucson; March 17 HOH Judging School (paint by Jeff Bernhardt); March 30-31 Indiana Chapter Kokomo; April 21 HOH Tech Session Marietta; April 29 HOH Chapter meet; May 3-5 Northwest Regional Seaside OR; May 12 HOH at Bud's, May 19 Miami Chapter meet; June 1-2 Michigan Chapter meet; June 7-9 North Central Regional Rochester MN; and June 30-July 4 National San Diego.

So join us at some of the above events and really boost your judging experience. The biggest judged event for HOH will be our Chapter meet on Sunday April 29 at Coughlin Chevrolet in Pataskala. I know we need judges and cars, so register soon and come on out. I'll see you at one or more of these events and be sure to keep the glassy side up!

P.S. Special thanks to Mike Treece for his help in organizing our HOH Judging and Tech Sessions! And thanks to the rest of you for making this a Top Flight Chapter.!

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
