Tech Article—Dino Lanno

Restoring a 3133689 Harrison Radiator 1957

When I bought my 1957 Corvette I realized it had its original brass radiator dated 57A Jan 1957 which is original to the February built car. All of the components were in tact including the fill neck the Harrison id plate soldered to the tank, overflow pipe, and drain cock. Unfortunately their was a leak.

When I looked for an old school radiator shop I realized they are rare. The HoO club members helped to find a local shop, Hedrick radiator shop.... the process was simple. I brought him the radiator and he de-soldered the mounting metal bracket on the bottom and sides, de-soldered the upper and lower tanks and then gave me the parts for me to straighten and sand blast the parts. He ordered an identical core which took 4 weeks to be delivered. He then assembled the radiator by laying solder on the upper and lower tanks. He then clamped the entire radiator together using specialized clamps and sweat it all together with solder and a torch. He has a large submersion tank and pressurized the radiator and looked for leaks.

The original core upon examination was contaminated and probably 50% blocked from debris and rust. Mainly at the top. I found silicon and gasket material in the core. Once the radiator was assembled it was painted and installed and looks and operates as intended. The cost was less than a new Dewitt's and I have the original mounting steel, tanks and filler neck. Brass sure gives you the option to restore versus the later aluminum versions. - Dino Lanno

When working on our cars, we all have questions about where to get parts, services, etc. As Lou stated, if you have a question about your car that you would like to have answered, the chapter email is a great source for all the experts in the club.

So, we thought it might be beneficial to start a section on resources in the local area that might benefit the club.

So, I'll start. My 1965 door windows have some scratches on them and I was looking for replace them. I needed two things: 1) A source for the glass 2) What the correct location on the markings are on the glass.

A: Dino Lanno (Glass Expert) - Indicated that Pilkington Classsics is right here in Grove City. Cost is \$254 per window. Lead time is only a couple of days. Without the markings, the glass is \$199.

Club members also commented that the marking can be on the inside or outside of the door.

So..if you have a question that might benefit other members..ask away! Lots of great knowledge and resources in the club. Especially, if you are working on a restoration.
