**Award Program**

## **Tech Article- Tom Fetchik**

Storing Tires, edited by Tom Fetchik NCRS #26770



The following data is excerpted from a document from Engineering at Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company. Although the tips listed are directed mainly at warehouse facilities and dealers, they are helpful tips if you are planning on storing your Corvette's tires for long periods of time.

The tread and sidewall of tires are compounded to resist deterioration caused by sunlight and ozone. Nevertheless, stored tires should be protected against these and other potentially damaging conditions.

#### **DO STORE**

Where the area is clean, cool, dry, dark and well ventilated but with a minimum of circulating air so that tires on the bottom of a stack retain their shape.

Whitewall to whitewall or Redline to Redline to avoid staining.

Best to store tires individually protected tire to tire by cardboard or wood spacers

### AVOID STORING

- $\Rightarrow$  Where area is wet, oily, greasy.
- $\Rightarrow$  Where subject to extreme temperatures.
- $\Rightarrow$  In the same area as an electric motor or other ozone generating sources
- $\Rightarrow$  On black asphalt or other heat absorbent surfaces.
- $\Rightarrow$  On decks, porches, outdoor pallets, or other open, unprotected areas.

### STORING TIRES MOUNTED ON VEHICLES

It is best to store a vehicle on blocks to remove all weight from the tires. If the vehicle cannot be blocked up from the storage surface, completely unload it so minimum weight will rest on the tires. Keep tires inflated to recommended operating inflation pressure. The surface should be firm, reasonably level, well drained and clean. Do not store on blacktop or oil stabilized surfaces.

If possible, move the vehicle at least every three months to prevent ozone cracking in the bulge area and also to prevent a "flat spot" from developing (due to strain from deflection). If tires do develop a temporary "flat spot", it will usually disappear in a short period of time (for example, the first 25 miles of service).

### STORING INFLATED TIRES NOT MOUNTED ON VEHICLES

All of the preceding guidelines apply in this instance. Keep tires inflated to recommended operating pressure.

### **BEFORE PLACING TIRES IN SERVICE**

- Inspect tires to be sure they are clean and free from foreign objects.
- Remove any water that has collected in an unmounted tire or wheel area.
- Check for proper operating inflation pressure.

# **Tech Article- Dino Lanno**

### Restoring a manual window regulator – C1

In the process of restoring my 1962 I remembered my passenger window would not roll up and down smoothly, the crank when rotated would jump in places which is a sure indicator that the arc gear has worn teeth. After looking at the regulator it was in good shape, but the teeth were rounded off. I bought the replacement gear which comes with a rivet as shown in the picture. Then started the disassembly....the window must be removed form the rollers and the 4 phillips screws with integral star washers remove the regulator from the inner door panel. The trick to removal and installation is that the movable window arm must be placed parallel to the long regulator arm. Once removed the regulator can be disassembled. I wire wheel and blasted the parts and finished them in a semi gloss black, the original dip paint was still noticable on the unrusted arms.

#### Regulator disaasembly -

- You remove the coil spring carefully, you grind off the mushroomed main assembly rivet flush This is the rivet that has a double D configuration be careful to grind flush so you can weld it during resassembly, then grind the arc gear assembly rivet....
- This gives you the following components; Pinion gear plate which needs cleaning and lube, the spring, the arc gear, and the regulator arm, and two rivets (You will reuse the double D).....

#### Reassembly -

- I took the arc gear and new rivet along with the original double D assembly rivet to my hydraulic press. I set up the rivet and gear on the main arm and located the double D rivet in place for location only and then set the rivet.
- I then proceeded to locate the pinion gear plate on the regulator arm and installed the double D rivet and clamped it all together
- With the assembly clamped, I proceeded to weld the end of the double D rivet to the main arm....remember I ground that rivet flat during disassembly
- Once the clamps are removed the entire assembly is put together....now all you have to do is install the spring and your finished.

Picture on left - You can see the 4 phillip screws that attach the window regulator to the inner door fiberglass and pictured right is the replacement gear and rivet

The main assembly rivet above left shows the double D for assembly and the slot that holds the spring that is pictured to the right



This is my original passenger side manual window regulator, the rivets were ground off....you can see remnants of dip paint process in black.
