"Restoration Time" Norbert Bertling (NCRS#19241)

I have owned my 1967 L-71 coupe - (photo 1) - since the early seventies. I bought it locally and drove it for two years or so. At that time, the car was not running well and gas was becoming harder and harder to get. One night I was driving west on Pulaski Highway toward Baltimore when a lady in a car driving in the opposite direction suddenly decided to make a sharp left into a gas station directly in front of me. I stood on the brakes, all four diskies locked up and I did a 360 to avoid hitting her. After swallowing hard to get my heart back down in my chest, I made the decision to take the car off the road and put it away "for awhile."



Fast forward to 1991, when I began phase 1 of disassembly. I was self-employed and things were going along smoothly. I got all excited about finally getting to the job at hand (you know, bagging and tagging). Then, life stepped in again. So, guess what got pushed to the back burner? I did not get serious about continuing the disassembly until the past three years. In 2015, I had to leave my full time job due to health issues, so I figured it was now or never. I'm happy to report that progress is rolling along now that I can spend more time dedicated to the "dirty work". Hence, I would like to share some products that I've used and found worked well for my purposes.

Vinegar – (photo 2) - I have found that a vinegar bath for 1 to 3 days will strip away heavy rust and paint from most any metal part you soak in it. I prefer cleaning vinegar over regular white vinegar because it is more acidic. It is inexpensive and you can use the bath about three times.

Power Washer – (photo 3) - This is part two of the one-two punch – after the rust and paint melt away with the vinegar bath, hit the part with your power washer and you will have clean metal that will require a rust inhibitor to keep it from flashing.

Air Compressor – (photo 4) – This is my trusty old craftsman. **A Strong Impact Wrench** – (photo 5) - Get the biggest, baddest torquiest you can find.













PB Blaster – (photo 6) - I should have bought stock in this stuff in the seventies – its "unique capillary action action" is unbeatable – if I had known in the beginning how much of this product I would be going through, I would have started buying it in gallon cans instead of rattle cans, and bought a \$4.00 spray bottle to apply it with – I often use it in conjunction with a **propane torch** - (photo 7) - and alternately heat and spray several times this technique has worked in 90% of my attempts to break frozen bolts.

Orange Citrus Stripper – (photo 8) - Citristrip is safe for fiberglass, moderately priced, and smells like an orange creamsicle – the neighborhood bees like it too! I have also used Captain Lee's Spra'-Strip which works very well, but is more aggressive.





Finally, I like to use local businesses and I always try to get a referral from someone I trust. It's also nice when two people give you the same good report. I have entrusted my engine rebuild to **JB's Auto Machine** at 9701 Philadelphia Road in Rosedale **410-686-6530**. They said I could give it to them assembled or disassembled. I wanted to take it down myself - (photo9) - to have the experience and getting good and dirty.

All the employees are experts in their own rite, and they never seem too busy to talk to you and share their knowledge. They are flexible and fair with their pricing and will make that extra effort to help you with grunt jobs like disassembling trailing arms, control arms, etc. They glass bead all parts upon request and will return all your original nuts and bolts.

I hope my next report will be about my *finished* car. I'm shooting for June 2, 2017 which is the 50th anniversary of its build date.

1994 Corvette Updates: Passenger Air Bag, Interior

September 2, 1994 marked the opening of the national Corvette Museum. Two new colors were introduced this year, Copper Metallic and Admiral Blue. The Copper Metallic was limited due to quality concerns and only 116 were produced. This was the last year for Black Rose Metallic.

The engine remained at 300 horsepower although the addition of a sequential fuel injection system improved idle, driveability and emmisions by firing the injectors in sequence with the firing order.

The standard 4-speed automatic transmission was updated to include electronic controls to improve shift quality and consistency. The designation went from 4L60 to 4L60-E. The PCM (Powertrain Control Module) reach was extended and it now controlled the shift points which occurred closer to the peak engine power for better performance. Even Barometric pressure became part of the mix, with shifting characteristics changing as needed. A lock-out on the new automatic prevented moving the selected to drive until the brake pedal was depressed.

All seating in 1994 is leather; cloth is no longer an option. The rear window in the convertible was changed from plastic to glass this year and includes an in-glass defroster element. The air conditioning system this year uses R-134A refrigerant, which is much more environmentally friendly. The instruments had new white instrument graphics which turned to a tangerine color at night. Additionally, a revised interior, which accommodated a passenger side airbag was included. The bad news was that it replaced the glove-box that everyone had grown to appreciate. Pockets were added to the door panels to make up for the lost storage area.



Above left: The steering wheel was redesigned as a two spoke. The move was regressive, as the earlier four spoke 1990 wheel had a lot more style. Right: The seats were redesigned with less of a side bolster. Entry and egress was easier and they fit a wider range of occupants but support during hard cornering was sacrificed. The new seats were leather only; cloth was no longer available.

Optional Goodyear run-flat tires (RPO WY5; \$70.00) were introduced. The low tire pressure warning indicator (RPO UJ6; \$325.00) was a required option with the run-flats.
