The judging school / tech session presented by Tony Avedisian generated a lot of questions since many members own newer Corvettes, such as C5, C6, C7. Tony showed a head from a C6 Z06 that had significant valve guide wear and the heads were replaced with less than 10,000 miles! Additionally, Tony presented a checklist of items that folks should consider checking when thinking about purchasing a used C5 or C6.

- 1. Steering column lock only 2005
- 2. Sway bars rusting making noise over bumps 1997 2013 all cars
- 3. Clutch master cylinder fluid all cars / years
- 4. Valve guide wear Z06 2006-13
- 5. Ricker arms needle bearing issues 1997 2013 all cars
- 6. Rear differential side yoke seal leaks all cars / years
- 7. Automatic transmission losing 3rd gear all cars / years
- 8. Ground connections rusting all cars / years
- 9. Front fender bowing lifting issue all cars / years
- 10. Starter harness getting hot all cars / years
- 11. Spark plug wires heat soaked all cars / years
- 12. Radiator cradle damage from curbs all cars / years
- 13. AC condensor stopped up all cars / years
- 14. AC compressor leaking from case all cars / years
- 15. Check all fluids all cars / years

B Pillar Weatherstrip Replacement on a 1996 Corvette Collector Edition Coupe (C4) Mel Lorden - #54728

On C4 coupes the original GM rear roof panel weatherstrip does an extremely good job of sealing, but unfortunately lacks great durability. GM weatherstrip (P/N A2906-1) is still available though it's very expensive.

As an alternative, I have found either Eckler's or Wilcox offers the best reproduction rear roof panel weatherstrip and it is far less costly. Besides doing an outstanding job of sealing, like the original, the weatherstrip is made from a modern, long-lasting synthetic rubber called ethylene propylene diene monomer or EPDM giving it great durability. The EPDM has a smooth urethane coating, which prevents water absorption and gives it a non-stick surface so the windows operate smoothly and the roof panel won't stick to the weatherstrip tearing it apart. Produced to GM factory specifications, this weatherstrip is as soft as the original.

Things you will need to get started:

- * Weatherstrip, Ecklers part number 120837. This part is the same for ALL C4s from years 1984-96.
- * One can of 3M Adhesive Remover (12 oz can) item number 03618
- * 4-Piece weatherstrip kit, Harbor Freight
- * Peratex Black Super Weatherstip adhesive, tube # 81850
- * GM Dielectric Silicone Grease, tube # 12345579
- * A couple clean rags and a small terry cloth towel



- Remove the Targa Top from the car and place away from work area.
- Gently remove the plastic retainer pins from each side of the weatherstrip. They are located at the bottom of the strip. Inspect the pins once removed as they may be used again if not worn or rotted.



- Gently remove the old weatherstrip from the channel. Be careful NOT to use a screwdriver or putty knife as you will scratch the channel or remove the matte channel finish. If your C4 has the "original" weatherstrip, it may break apart when removing. Mine was replaced about 9 years ago and came off easier than the original.
- Take the 3M Adhesive Remover and spray about a 4 or 5 inch section of the channel where you just removed the weatherstip. Don't over do the spray as it will run down the side pillars if you spray too much.
- Take a clean rag and gently rub where you have sprayed the adhesive remover. You will need to repeat this step several times to thoroughly remove the old weatherstip and clean out the channel. The channel should NOT have any remnants or pieces after cleaning.



• Once all the adhesive is removed, place the new weatherstrip in the SIDE channels ONLY. DO NOT GLUE weatherstip at this time.



• You want to make sure you position the new weatherstip flush to the B Pillar support and place in both side channels to ensure one side is not longer than the other and there are no gaps. The weatherstip has a notch at both ends so you can align the bottom to the frame.



Once you have both sides in place and there are no gaps and the strip is not stretched out, you can begin to place adhesive. Gently remove one side at a time and place adhesive directly on the weatherstrip. The bottom of the weatherstrip is the only places you will apply adhesive directly to the strip. All other places you will apply adhesive into the strip channel.



- Once you attach the bottom of the strip to the pillar using the retainer pin you removed in step two, apply a thin bead of adhesive in the channel. Don't get too far ahead of yourself as you don't want the adhesive to get dry or set up.
- Gently insert the weatherstrip into the channel, front first, and using your weatherstrp tools seat the strip into the channel



• Once you complete the installation, place a small piece of masking tape to each end of the weatherstip to ensure it bonds to the side pillar.



- Close doors and let sit overnight to cure adhesive.
- The next day, remove the masking tape and remove any adhesive from the pillar or weathstrip.
- Take a small dap of Dielectric Grease and rub onto new weatherstrip. Do half at a time. Let it sit for approximately 20 minutes and wipe off with terry cloth towel. You will get matte luster that looks great.
- Re-install Targa Top.
- Check that windows move freely and that everything lines up.
- A JOB WELL DONE!!!!!!

Media Blasting / Prepping 1970 Corvette for Primer / Paint James Buckley - NCRS #55336

The following article / pictures provide some insight into the steps needed to be taken to media blast / hand sand a 1970 Corvette Stingray and pictures showing the extent of the media blasting / hand sanding required to prep the car for primer and then the painting process.









There's nothing like a nice, clean slate. In fact, it's the thing car-guy (and -gal) dreams are made of-no layers of old paint, no hidden surprises, and instant access for bodywork. When it comes to stripping our Corvettes down to the bare basics, there are three options: chemical strippers, by hand with sandpaper and other tools, and media blasting. Manually, you can use sandpaper either mounted on a dual-action sander and "jitterbugs," sanding blocks and contoured sanding pads, razor blades, or our personal favorite method, a wet sponge and baking soda.

You will need multiple grades of sandpaper to remove the paint and leave a smooth surface in the fiberglass. Start with 120 grit sandpaper and sand in a back and forth or circular motion to begin removing the paint. Switch to a finer grade sandpaper like 80 grit once you have removed the majority of the paint and re-sand the area.

- Don't worry about making the fiberglass completely smooth; a slightly abrasive surface will help the new paint stick.
- Be careful not to sand beyond the paint and through the fiberglass.
- If you choose to use a power sander, be careful not to sand too deep through the paint with either grit of paper.
