True Barnfind - 1970 Corvette - Part 2 Kim / Rob Barnes - NCRS #18969

The victim - a 1970 Corvette Convertible - Donnybrooke Green on green vinyl. The Corvette was located by a Ferrari collector friend in Vermont. The car had been sitting in a shed for the last ten years. The original owner had died and his family was agreeable to selling the Corvette. We purchased it site unseen in November 2018. Fortunately the owner saved the protecto plate, warrenty books and other original paperwork; and the car has all the original components including interior and paint.

The C3 arrived in Maryland surprisingly DOA and rodent infested in December 2018. Before attempting to start the engine, we rotated the assembly to make sure it was not locked up.

First, we took the dash out to the firewall ensuring that all wiring and vacuum lines were intact. We cleaned up electrical connections behind the dash and engine compartment, to include corroded connections with transistorized Ignition system. We reassembled the interior to include freeing up the power windows and door locks.

Second, we tried to start the engine after purging all the old fuel from the tank, lines, and carburetor. We then put five gallons of Aviation Fuel (low lead 100 octane in the tank). The engine now had spark, fuel and air; it started quickly but had no oil pressure. So, we put it on the lift and pulled the oil pan. We inspected the oil pan, windage tray and passage doors which were all congealed with one inch deep sludge (sludge was above the elevation of the oil pump pick up screen).

Third, was a careful clean up of the oil pan; inspect and photo document the exposed lower end of the engine (which looked good). We then reinstalled the oil pan with the existing oil pump still installed. We filled the crankcase with 10-30 GM oil and Lucas ZDDP additive. We removed the distributor and primed the oiling system with a Jegs oil pump primer tool.

Fourth, Kim started the car; ever the protector, I was outside with a fire extinguisher, just in case! The car started right away and ran beautifully with around 70 lbs of oil pressure. Initial problems resolved, and follow-on cleanup will follow in the next installment. Here are some pictures of the progress to get the car started!

C5 Corvette Retires With Honors



Corvette's fifth generation drew to an end with the 2004 Corvette. To mark the end of the C5 generation, GM introduced a special Commemorative Edition Corvette. This Corvette was designed to honor Corvette's return to racing. The Commemorative Edition 2004 Corvettes featured LeMans Blue paint and Shale interior. Convertible, Coupe, and Z06 models were available in this special commemorative edition. Special LeMans and Corvette C5 emblems were featured on the car along with the headrests. Additionally, introduced with the commemorative package on all of the specially equipped coupes and convertibles were the polished alloy wheels. This could be ordered as part of the regular equipment group, and was also available for either the coupe or convertible upgrade at an additional cost. The Commemorative Edition option for the Z06 Coupe included a carbon-fiber hood which help minimize the nose weight of the car, reducing the weight by 10.6 pounds. The 2004 Z06 special edition received additional testing at the Nürburgring (a world renowned race track and proving ground for many of the top automotive manufacturers), which resulted in many mechanical improvements for the vehicle. These improvements include: revised damping for the Sachs gas-pressure shock absorbers, stiffer bushings for the upper control arms, and softer bushings for the rear anti-roll bar.

Special C5 Corvette race cars, with the designation of C5-R had seen consistent success in the most demanding race, the 24 Hours of Le Mans. This was a factory effort which had resulted in podium finishes (third place or better) in the last 29 races and victories in the last 20 races.

The C5-R record in the GTS class at Le Mans was impressive:

2000: 3rd and 4th
2001: 1st and 2nd
2002: 1st and 2nd
2003: 2nd and 3rd

Suspension tweaks improved handling of the Z06 without a sacrifice in ride quality. The hood for the Z06 Commemorative Edition was carbon fiber. It was the first use of the exotic material for a painted exterior panel on a car built in North America and was an experiment of sorts for GM. The carbon fiber advantage of high strength with less weight was realized with a 10.6 pounds weight saving. The inside hood panel is a hybrid of carbon fiber and Sheet Molded Compound (SMC).

Specifically developed for the Corvette, the Commemorative Edition Z06 hood achieves a higher level of exterior finish quality than previous automotive applications of carbon fiber. On most carbon fiber parts, the woven pattern of the material is easily seen beneath the exterior finish. To diminish that effect and preserve the rich LeMans Blue paint finish, on the Commemorative Edition Z06 the carbon fibers are aligned in a single direction. The only visual cue that the hood is made from carbon fiber is in the red border surrounding the silver graphic on the car, which is arranged in a woven pattern signifying the material that lies underneath. The overall result is a finish consistent with the rest of the car that gives just a slight hint at the carbon fiber construction.

For the sixth time a Corvette was chosen to pace the Indy 500, with actor Morgan Freeman assigned the driving honors.

The C5 would be a tough act to follow. The technology advances, such as the Magnetic Selective Ride Control and the "drive by wire" throttle, had been extraordinary. New ground was also broken with the Z06, a high performance model that effectively revived the dual purpose race track / street sports car concept. But the competition had also been making progress, and it had never been part of the Corvette's DNA to back away from a challenge. Things were getting interesting
































Heart Attack
