The following personal story on a very unique Italian-designed automobile named Iso Grifo is offered by one of our very own Mason Dixon Chapter member – Chris Frederick, NCRS#45021.

I was reading your newsletter request and I thought you might get a kick out of an ISO Grifo I am working on. The short story behind these cars is GM supplied small and big blocks to the Italian refrigerator maker, Iso Rivolta to produce a luxury Italian sports car that could compete with Ferrari. Enzo's head engineer, Bizzerini quit Enzo after creating the 1963 Ferrari GTO that just sold for \$51 million. Bizzerini and Rivolta created 313 Iso Grifo's before GM demanded prepayment in 1973 when they were struggling. Most of the Corvette motors were 327 cu 300hp however a few 350 hp and 365 hp motors made it across the Atlantic.

I flew this 1966 across the Atlantic this January on a 747 which is completely restored with the original motor. The manifold and carb are incorrect so we found a correct date coded manifold and carb to replace it.

# Replace 1959 Windshield Gasket Dirk Hoffman - NCRS 49148

In 1971, I purchased my first and last Corvette, a 1959 model!

The only thing it needed to pass state inspection was a windshield. I took it to the local auto glass shop and \$108 later, I had a new windshield, nicely butchered and installed. They put a massive quantity of black caulk to fill the new gap between the windshield frame and the body. I was 20 years old with no regard for aesthetics, and obviously the glass shop didn't either. It leaked in the rain with the ill-fitting convertible top, but all Corvettes leaked in the rain, I was told.

The black lacquer paint was badly decomposing, so I got girls in bikinis to wet-sand the entire car. The windshield stayed on the car during the repaint and was simply taped and papered from the caulking to the header. Fresh coats of the original black lacquer were applied. Total cost \$250. The paint served me well, and it shined up nicely for almost 50 years.

When I would go to Corvettes at Carlisle and see all the freshly painted beauties, I realized how thin and anemic my paint job had become. The crowning blow was around 2020 when I covered the car for the winter and secured a plastic cover to the garage floor to keep the mice out. In the Spring, I removed the plastic and a wet car cover. All the beads of water on the paint were actually blisters, so the car was no better off than when I bought the sunbaked love-of-my-life in '71.

When you live in a time capsule for 50 years, sticker shock hits hard when pricing a new paint job. Prices started at \$20k and then you start down the rabbit hole of spending the money and not knowing when or where to stop!

A few things I can still do myself, so I thought I'd take on the replacement of the windshield gasket. I found Rich 5962's article on the Corvette Forum and used that as a guide for dis- and reassembly. I needed to have the posts rechromed along with other parts and that was my next "sticker-shock". The posts had to have the tabs rewelded as it was standard procedure to break them off when the glass shop removed the windshield according to the rechrome guru.

I got my new gasket lubed up and eased onto the windshield. This is going to be a piece of cake. But then you have to put the upper and lower channels on. The upper channel went on with a few fist bumps. The bottom channel was an exercise in frustration for a very long time. Rich5962 said to hit it with a rubber mallet, now REALLY hit it. So I grit my teeth, squint my eyes, and whack it a good shot! Nothing happened.

I probably tried that process over and over a couple dozen times, changing my approach angle slightly with each attempt. Each hit I fully expected the windshield to crack or shatter. It was winter. I was cold and getting nowhere.

"The Mother of Invention" kicked in. I'm an old woodshop teacher, and bar clamps were my tools of choice for any build. I went to Harbor Freight and bought a half dozen 24" bar clamps. I carefully clamped top channel to bottom channel and gently squeezed each bar clamp handle, working my way back and forth across the windshield. To my amazement the process worked and the gasket set into the channel without all the hammering drama. After that success, the rest of the assembly went as well as can be expected when fitting rechromed parts into original stainless steel trim. It was a thrill when my sons lowered the completed windshield assembly back onto the car! **JOB WELL DONE!!!!!**
