The NCRS Corvette Judging Reference Manual, 8th Edition ("JRM")

discusses NCRS Flight Judging in Sections 2 and 3

NCRS now adds Sections 19 and 20 to the JRM, to discuss NCRS Concours Judging

Sections 19 & 20 of the JRM are written to parallel Sections 2& 3.

Consequently, several items that pertain to Flight Judging will not apply to Concours Judging.

SECTION 19 – NCRS <u>CONCOURS JUDGING</u> PURPOSE, STANDARD, GUIDELINES, RULES & PROCEDURES

MODEL YEARS JUDGED, MEMBERSHIP & VEHICLE IDENTIFICATION NCRS Concours Judging is open to any model year Corvette that is a model year which is eligible for NCRS Flight Judging, as long as the current owner is an NCRS member in good standing. The car must be entered and shown by the Owner/Member, and proof of ownership similar to that required for NCRS Flight Judging must be provided. The car must have been originally manufactured as a Corvette by General Motors Corporation, and it must have the original, and correctly attached, factory-issued VIN plate. Alternatively, a state-approved replacement VIN plate that matches the title and/or vehicle registration will be accepted if it appears to comply with all of that state's regulations. Should a car appear with a Chevrolet (GM) issued duplicate VIN plate, it must be accompanied with documentation from Chevrolet Motor Division of GM confirming such issuance that is acceptable to NCRS. Any car appearing without identification as described here shall be ineligible for any NCRS Judging.



SECTION 19 – NCRS CONCOURS JUDGING PURPOSE, STANDARD, GUIDELINES, RULES & PROCEDURES

1. MODEL YEARS JUDGED, MEMBERSHIP & VEHICLE IDENTIFICATION

 Model Years eligible: same as Flight Judging, currently 1953-2004
 Must be shown and owned by a member
 Must have been born as a Corvette...no kit cars
 Must have an original VIN Tag or state-

issued tag or GM replacement Tag



NCRS CONCOURS JUDGING STANDARD

Cars are to be judged solely for Appearance. The NCRS Concours Judging System is designed to accommodate vehicles that have been modified to the extent that they would be subject to significant Originality Deductions under the NCRS Flight Judging System.

Originality will not be evaluated under the NCRS Concours Judging System. Appearance and Functionality will be the only categories evaluated under this program.

Because Originality is not a factor in this judging program, Trim Tags ("TT") and Service Parts Identification Labels ("SPIL") will not be required or evaluated. Cars previously branded as Counterfeit for reasons related to TT or SPIL variances are eligible for judging under this program. Likewise, cars branded as Counterfeit for horsepower changes, casting number or date modifications and other such modifications will also be eligible for this program. However, cars branded as Counterfeit for VIN Tag variances will not be eligible for entry for judging under any NCRS judging system.



> All cars are to be judged on Appearance and Operations only Originality and CDCIF are not factors Customization is allowed and encouraged Trim Tags ("TT) and Service Parts Identification Labels ("SPIL") are not necessary or required Cars previously branded Counterfeit by NCRS are eligible, except for cars

NCRS CONCOURS JUDGING DIVISIONS NCRS Concours Judging shall be available to the same model years that are eligible for NCRS Flight Judging. There shall be two Judging Divisions within each model-year grouping. The Stock Division includes all cars that are basically stock appearing (fiberglass, body color, etc.) with the doors, hood and trunk closed, disregarding wheels and tires. The Modified Division includes all cars that do not qualify for the Stock Division.



> All model years currently available for Flight Judging are eligible for Concours Judging \succ Two Divisions for Concours Judging: Stock Division \succ With doors, hood and trunk (ise) closed, the car and paint color are factory stockappearing; disregard wheels and tires Modified Division-all others

15. JUDGING SUMMARY SHEET (Green Sheet) REQUIREMENTS

The owner is required to provide and fill out the information requested on the NCRS Judging Summary Sheet (the "Green Sheet") and is required to read, agree to, and sign the Hold Harmless Clause on that form.

Correct entry of Member # and VIN are essential

Hold Harmless signature is mandatory

Disclosure statement & signature unnecessary



16. CONCOURS JUDGING SCORE SHEET REVIEW

Following Concours Judging of a particular judging section, the judges will review the score sheet with the owner, and answer any questions the owner may have regarding the judging decisions. Other features of this Item shall be similar to the rules and procedures as outlined in Section 2, Item 16, of this manual.

The review after a section is completed is a brief review; a more comprehensive review can occur at the completion of all judging
 Owner must initial the score sheet
 Write legibly and clearly...these are the only copies of the score sheets

34. COUNTERFEIT DISCOVERY PENALTIES NCRS Concours Judging shall utilize the same rules and procedures as outlined in Section 2, Item 34, of this manual. However, the only portion of that Item that will apply to NCRS Concours Judging is VIN Tag variances; also see Section 19, Item 2 above.

By definition, NCRS Concours Judging allows modification of the Member's Corvette

Most items that would cause a car to be branded Counterfeit in NCRS Flight Judging are *disregarded* in NCRS Concours Judging

The exception to the above...



34. COUNTERFEIT DISCOVERY PENALTIES

NCRS Concours Judging shall utilize the same rules and procedures as outlined in Section 2, Item 34, of this manual. However, the only portion of that Item that will apply to NCRS Concours Judging is VIN Tag variances; also see Section 19, Item 2 above.

Any Corvette entered for any NCRS Judging that is determined to have VIN Tag variances will be branded Counterfeit

There are governmental remedies to certain VIN Tag variances that will allow for removal of the NCRS Counterfeit brand



SECTION 20 – NCRS CONCOURS JUDGING SCORING SYSTEM

1. OVERALL SCORING.

The NCRS Concours Judging scoring system is based on the deductive method of scoring. All cars begin the process with 2250 points. Whole-point deductions are made for those items whose operation or appearance falls outside of the NCRS Concours Judging Standard. At the completion of judging, the total points deducted are subtracted from 2250. The bonus points outlined in Section 19, Item 25, are then added and the result is divided by 22.5 to arrive at a total net score that is based upon a 100-point system. These calculations are made to one decimal place and are rounded down to the nearest tenth. For example, a calculated score of 93.978 would be listed as 93.9 and noted as such on the score sheet and other appropriate records. This score would also be the Grand Total Score unless driven mileage points have been earned by the owner, as described under DRIVEN MILEAGE POINTS. These driven mileage points, described as a percentage, will be added to the net score to arrive at the Grand Total Score.



1. OVERALL SCORING.

Similar to Flight Judging

DRIVEN MILEAGE POINTS

2. NCRS Concours Judging shall utilize the same rules and procedures as outlined in Section 3, Item 3, of this manual, except that the minimum net score necessary to receive mileage points is 85.0.

Every 10 miles = 0.1% added to net score

> All net scores >85.0 are eligible

Max Driving Points = net score x 10%

12. APPEARANCE SCORING

NCRS Concours Judging will evaluate a part or component solely on its appearance when scoring the Interior, Exterior, Mechanical and Chassis sections. Originality will not be considered. When a part or component is not present, the judge should make a full deduction for the item if it is deemed to be "missing." However, if the judge determines that the part has been properly and skillfully "removed" by the owner in the process of personalizing the car, no deduction shall be taken.

Judges should apply the following guidelines when evaluating appearance of an item:Appearance is superior to typical factory production (TFP)0% deductionAppearance is consistent with TFP0-10% deductionAppearance is slightly inferior to TFP10-30% deductionAppearance is grossly inferior to TFP30-75% deductionMissing (as defined above)100% deduction

Damage and deterioration due to the passage of time are subject to Appearance deductions. As with the NCRS Flight Judging System, a part that is simply "dirty" will not receive an Appearance deduction, but will be subject to a deduction for Cleanliness.

12. APPEARANCE SCORING

Missing? Please explain

- A part or component that is simply missing will receive a 100% deduction
- But, a part or component properly and skillfully removed in the course of personalization will not be treated as a missing item





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
